# In-text Citations

- In-text citations are mini-citations that occur within the body of your paper, either as parenthetical notes or as footnotes at the bottom of the page.
  - For every in-text citation, there must be a corresponding entry in your reference list.

#### 1. Standard formula

Text you are citing (Author's name, year)

#### 2. No author

Text you are citing (Name of article, year)

#### 3. No date

Text you are citing (Author's name, n.d.)

### 4. Author's name as part of the text

Text you are citing by Author (year)

### 5. Group as author

First time: Text you are citing (Group name [initials], year)

Times after: Text you are citing (Initials, year)

## 6. Multiple works

Text you are citing (Author, year; Author, year)

### 7. Direct quote

"Text you are quoting" (Author, year, p. #)

If the quote has more than 40 words, it must be written as a separate lock from the rest of the text and without quotation marks. (author, year, p. #)

# 8. Multiple authors

Two authors: Text you are citing (Author & author, year)

Three to five authors:

First time: Text you are citing (Author, author, & author, year)

Times after: Text you are citing (Author et al., year)

Six or more authors: Text you are citing (Author et al., year)
